



Purpose

This Worksheet includes a list of community benefits. It is not an exhaustive list, and not every benefit would work in every community. This worksheet is intended as a starting place for community discussions to help you develop your own list of community benefit priorities.

Columns 1 and 2 are general categories of benefits. Column 3 provides space to rate and rank the benefits on a scale of 1 to 5, with 5 being "Very Interested." Column 4 includes space for notes.
